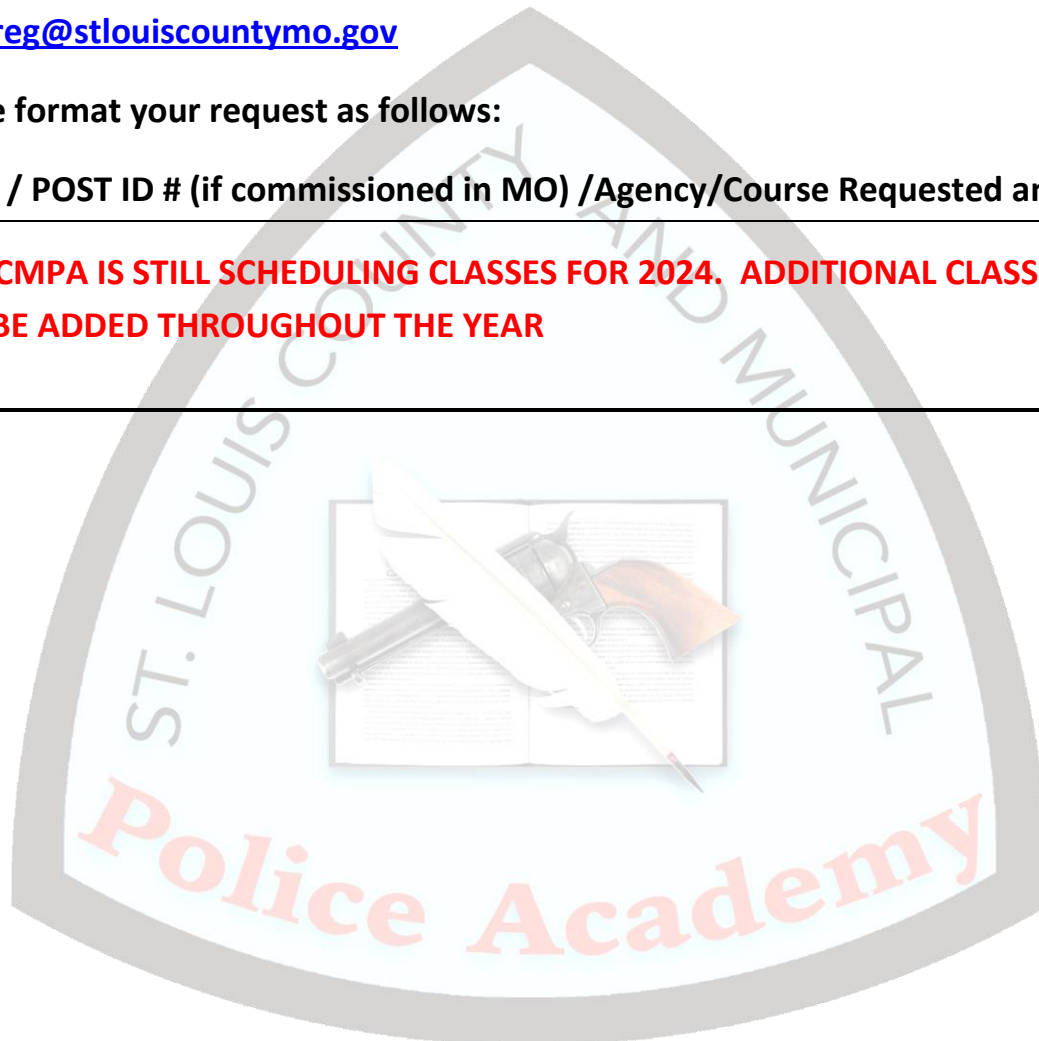

Dark Web Forensics & Investigations

The internet is made up of three main parts, the Clear Net, the Deep Web, and the Dark Web. The Dark Web contains resources not indexed by search engines such as Google. Additionally these resources must be accessed by special browsers and the data communications must be encrypted. Many times, the resources contain information or offer items that are criminal in nature. This has been the case of many well-known sites such as Silk Road, AlphaBay and many more.

Additionally, these sites are using digital cryptocurrency, such as Bitcoin, Dogecoin, Monero and others for financial transactions.

This class will introduce the attendee to how the Dark Web works, how the sites can be accessed, and how cryptocurrency is used to pay for the services offered by these resources, as well as discussing artifacts created on computers and mobile devices using these resources.

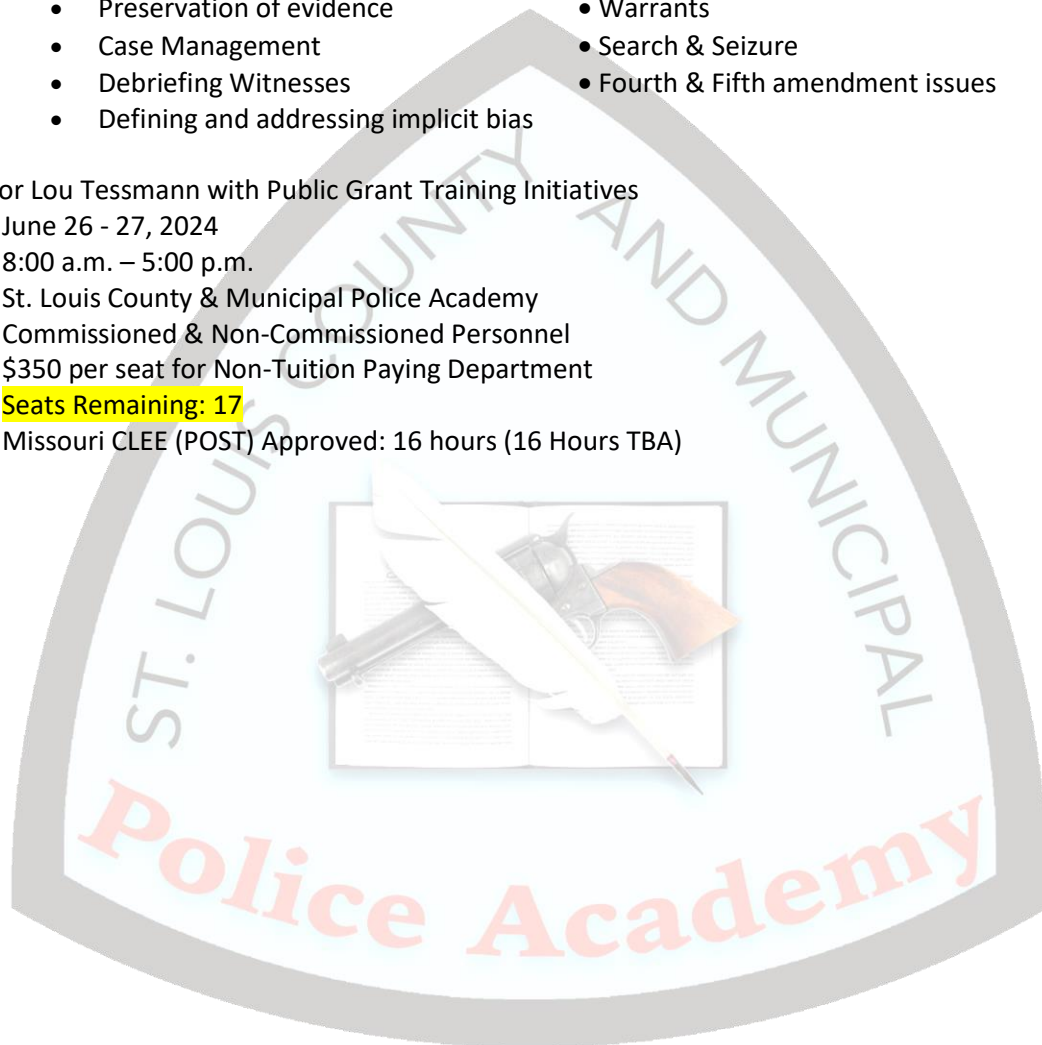

Five Stages of Interview & Interrogation Techniques

Course Objectives:

- Traits of Deception: Identify 18 traits researchers have identified which would challenge seasoned interviewers regarding detecting deception.
- Types of Denial: Understanding reasons why and how people lie will assist the interviewer in developing information which can be used in the Review & Resolution Stage.
- Basic Interview Theories: Simple theories will be explained and discussed which will allow the interviewer to understand interview concepts. These concepts will include Typical Interview Faux Pas, Setting Up the Room and Case Preparation.
- Rapport Building: Learning How To Be A Good Listener will help establish empathy which is a crucial building block of rapport.
- Five Stages of Successful Interviews: These stages will allow the interviewer to learn and develop a better formula of interviewing all suspects.
- Analytical Disclosure Dialogue: These key critical questions will reveal answers which will allow the interviewer to analyze responses to these questions. The responses then can be categorized as being typically acceptable or unacceptable responses.
- Improving Listening Skills: Listening is an essential part of communication and is different from hearing. Being a good and patient listener will assist the interviewer to become more effective.
- Assessing Verbal Responses: The key to successful interviews is to unlock what the person is saying in response to critical questions in addition to listening to the person's facts and circumstances surrounding the case.
- Assessing Non-Verbal Behaviors: Recent research has shown that interviewers are being misled by non-verbal behavior. This area will focus on how to use observable body language to the benefit of the interviewer.

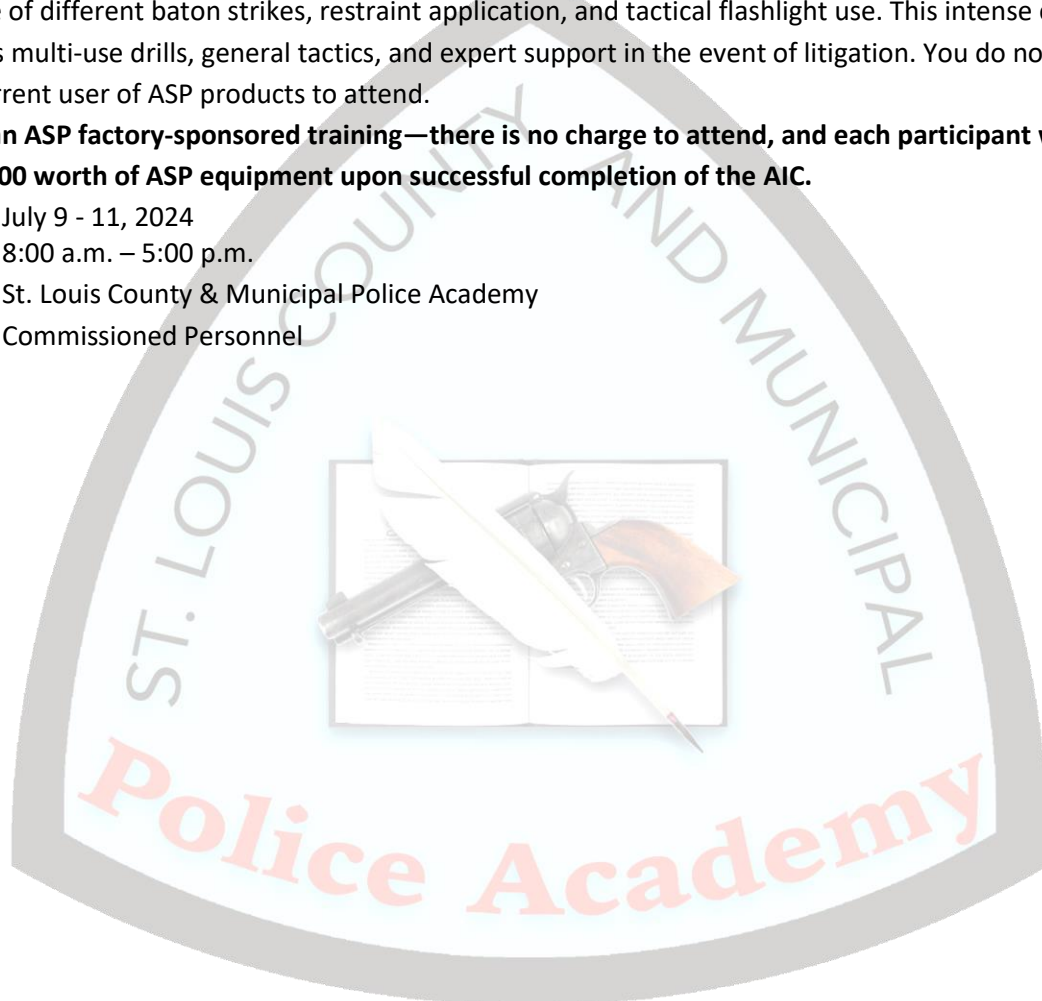

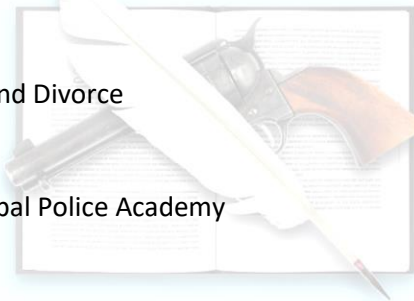

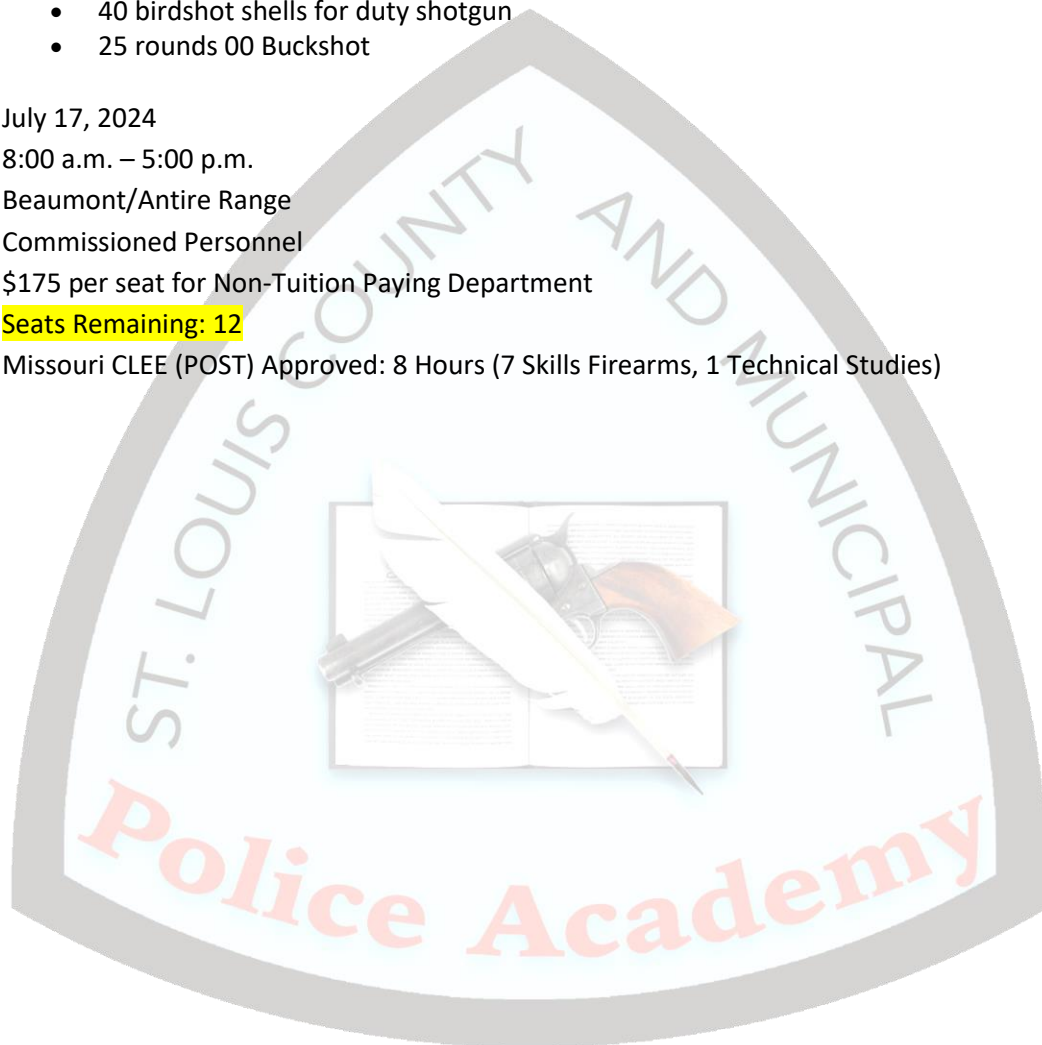

Search Warrant and Affidavit Preparation in Criminal Investigations

This program is designed for officers, investigators, and supervisors/commanders who may have the responsibility to write, execute, and manage search warrants. This is a “little lecture, more writing search warrants” course where attendees will become proficient in drafting a variety of mock crime search warrant applications, affidavits, the search warrant itself, and inventory returns. **Attendees are strongly encouraged to bring a laptop computer with Microsoft Word that can be used for the course.**

- Applicable US Constitution, Missouri State Statutes, and US Supreme rulings relative to unreasonable search and seizure and the probable cause needed to apply for search warrants
- Legal exemptions to the search warrant requirement
- Discussion/explanation of the application, affidavit, search warrant, and search warrant return
- Procedures of submitting the search warrant application to the prosecutor, getting it approved by a judge, executing the search warrant, drafting the inventory, and providing a return to the court
- The importance of containing all the details in the affidavit to establish probable cause and establishing the ability to search specific areas/locations (four corners doctrine)
- Procedures in conducting a proper search during the execution of the search warrant
- Practical exercises in writing numerous search warrant examples of mock crimes

Emerging Legal Trends for Supervisors and Law Enforcement Officers

Over the last two decades law enforcement agencies and individual law enforcement officers in the United States have been the subject of intense public scrutiny. The litigious condition of American society has been a key factor in this scrutiny. The very nature of police work i.e. use of force; high-speed driving and pursuits; and arrest, lends itself to complaints and lawsuits from those that law enforcement officers have contact with.

Law enforcement officers must have a working knowledge of the developing laws relating to police civil liability and discipline. Officers must be aware that they may be held accountable for decisions made by a court having jurisdiction over them. It is the developing law that guides police training, operations, individual conduct and operations. A failure to recognize the importance of this area of the law can lead to serious monetary consequences for individual police officers, supervisors, police executives and police agencies as a whole. In extreme cases, a failure to follow the rules set forth by the courts can result in criminal sanctions.

The course is structured in such a way as to assist officers and agencies in making an assessment of their particular level of risk-exposure by examining court decisions that have interpreted acceptable standards of conduct by officers.

Cell Phone Investigation Techniques

It has become increasingly difficult for law enforcement to successfully exploit cell phones due to the evolution of smartphone technology. Criminals' heavy reliance on cell phones makes it crucial for police officers to learn common cell phone terminology and understand the data they receive from cell phone companies. Historical cell-site data and specialized location records have been utilized in hundreds of investigations to successfully track a criminal or put them near a crime scene. Information will be presented during this block of instructions on the benefits of using these records, the limitations of the records, and the best software to map the records.

Smartphone Applications (APPS) have become the preferred method of communication for criminals. Although the content of many APPS is encrypted, there are digital imprints left behind on the actual device. Information will be presented on various APPS, as well as the types of data that can be obtained from the APP providers. Wiretap investigations can produce very powerful and overwhelming evidence of guilt; The course will provide students with the fundamental aspects of developing wiretap investigations, uses and analyzing of pen registers. The final blocks of instruction will involve the use of cell phone geo fences around a crime scene and Wi-Fi router interrogation. These advanced techniques have proven extremely useful in hundreds of investigations. 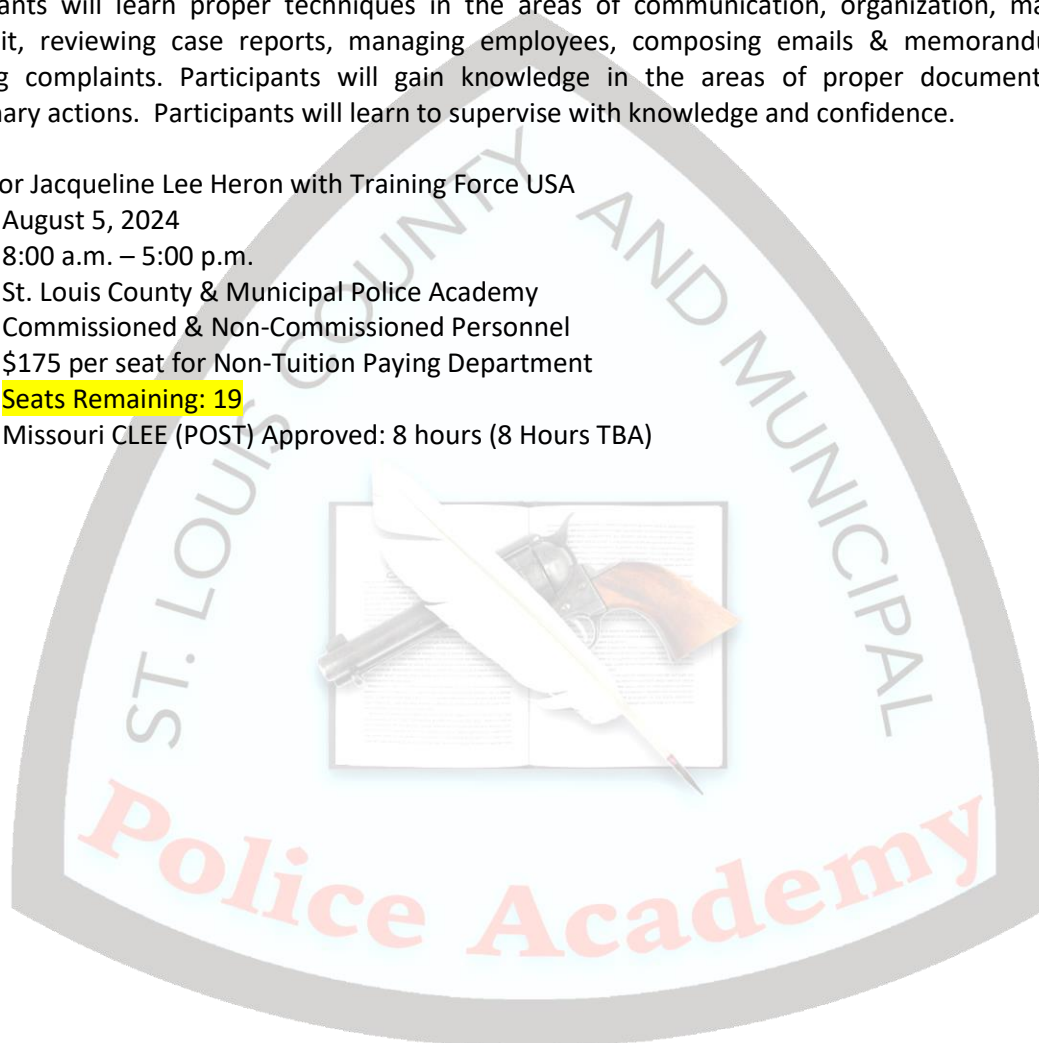

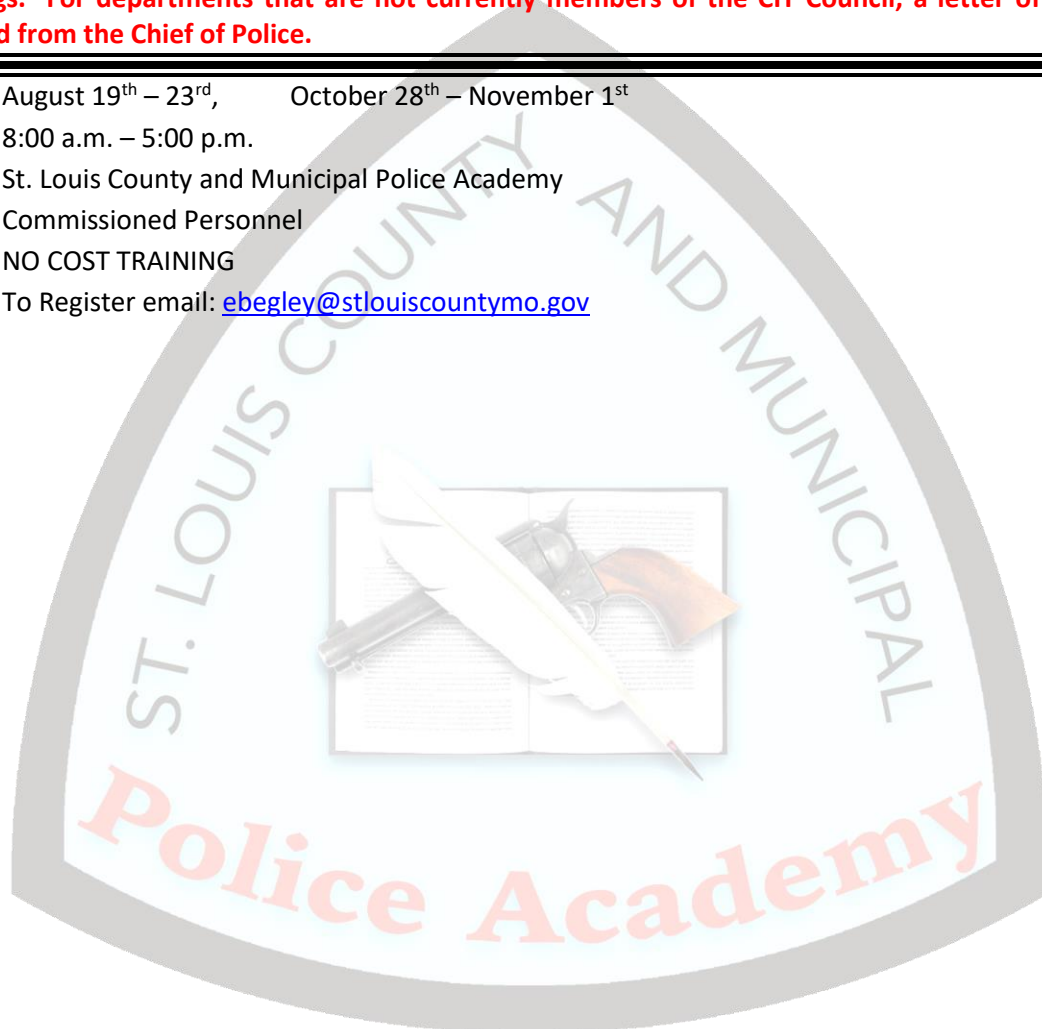

3-Day New Detective and Criminal Investigator

This training, designed for the newly assigned detective/criminal investigator, provides a comprehensive overview of techniques and the investigative steps that are necessary to investigate criminal incidents (no matter the type of crime) whether it be a homicide, child death, sexual crime, property crimes or financial crimes. Participants will learn to apply basic principles of scene preservation, recognizing and applying 4th amendment issues, understanding the type of forensic evidence that may be available, other types of physical evidence and the methods of locating, seizing, and preserving for laboratory examinations/data base searches to help identify the person(s) responsible.

While technology (the internet, communications and cellular/smart phone capabilities, security cameras, databases, social media, etc.) plays an important role in today's criminal investigations and may be very helpful in solving cases, we must still rely on traditional methods, such as neighborhood canvasses, developing leads and information, face-to-face interviews of victims and witnesses, understanding criminal behavior and the vital importance of documenting and facts and circumstances into an accurate, understandable and comprehensive report necessary for successful prosecutions and other purposes.

Today's detective and criminal investigator must be proficient in a wide variety of knowledge and skills – from the basics, such as interview and interrogation to report writing, the ever changing legal requirements, search and seizure and the 4th amendment, crime scene issues, and suspect development while also keeping up-to-date with the latest in science and laboratory capabilities, technologies and data availability to assist in identifying criminals, managing “big data,” and new techniques on forensic evidence like genetic genealogy.

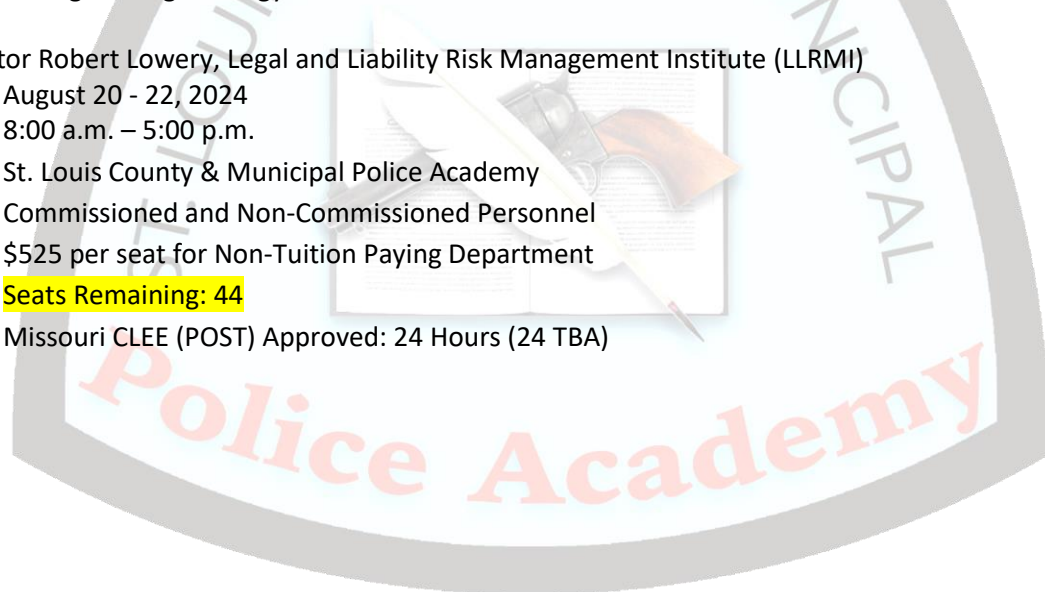

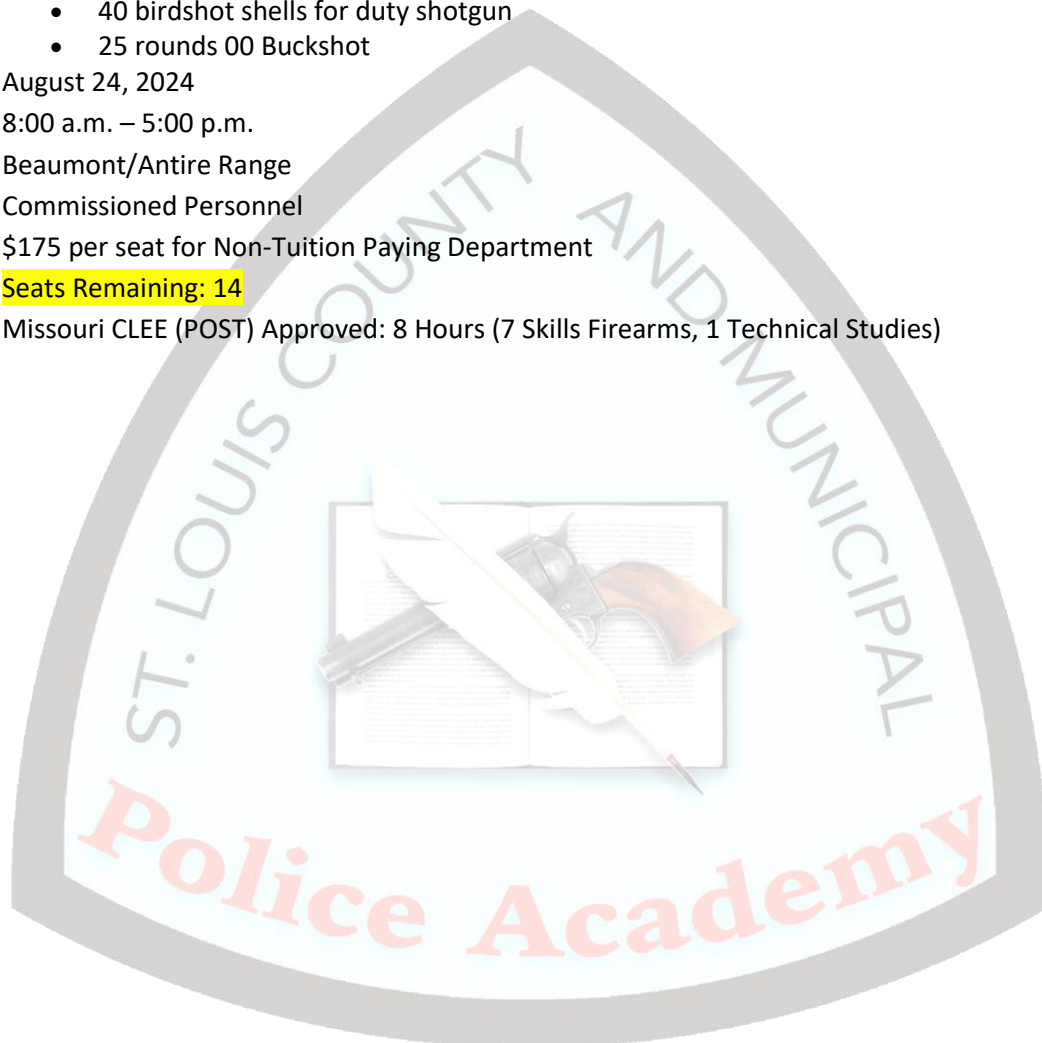

Courtroom Testimony for the Forensic Science Professional

This Courtroom Testimony for the Forensic Science Professional's course is designed to instruct proper testimony techniques to forensic science professionals, such as those employed in the fields of crime scene investigations, fingerprint analysis, and laboratory analysis.

Practitioners in these disciplines are frequently called upon to testify in court regarding the techniques, observations, and conclusions undertaken in their work. Often, they are requested to express opinions in their courtroom testimony, which is only possible when they are accepted by the court as expert witnesses. The goal of this course is to provide the students with the knowledge and practical experience necessary to successfully testify in a court of law as a forensic expert witness.

The first step in being accepted as a forensic expert witness is to survive the "voir dire." Students will learn how to prepare themselves and the concerned attorney(s) for this important initial step. The course will continue by covering techniques the witness can employ to more effectively explain scientific evidence to the judge and jury.

Concepts covered in the course will be reinforced by practical exercises in which the students will participate. Upon completion of this course of training, the student will:

- Describe the Federal and local rules of evidence
- Discuss the proper role of an expert witness within the judicial system
- Discuss the Daubert trilogy
- Discuss Daubert and Frye and explain how they differ
- Describe a minimum of two significant court cases related to forensic science
- Discuss the impact of the PCAST report
- Create an effective and professional Curriculum Vitae
- Describe the difference between criminal and civil cases
- Describe professional attire and demeanor
- Discuss different learning techniques (VARK) and know how to adjust and teach each to capture the juror's attention and ensure they understand the scientific concepts
- Discuss the deposition process, pretrial conference and in limine motions
- Demonstrate court ready testimony including professional attire, demeanor, answering qualifying voir dire questions and utilizing visual aids while teaching the jury

Early Intervention Program

Law enforcement agencies across the United States are facing increased scrutiny for failure to identify and correct misconduct infractions by their officers. Many police agencies have implemented tracking systems that identify patterns of behavioral concern by their officers like sick time abuse, multiple use of force complaints, excessive resisting arrest charges, continuous loafing or sleeping on duty, and continuously missing court.

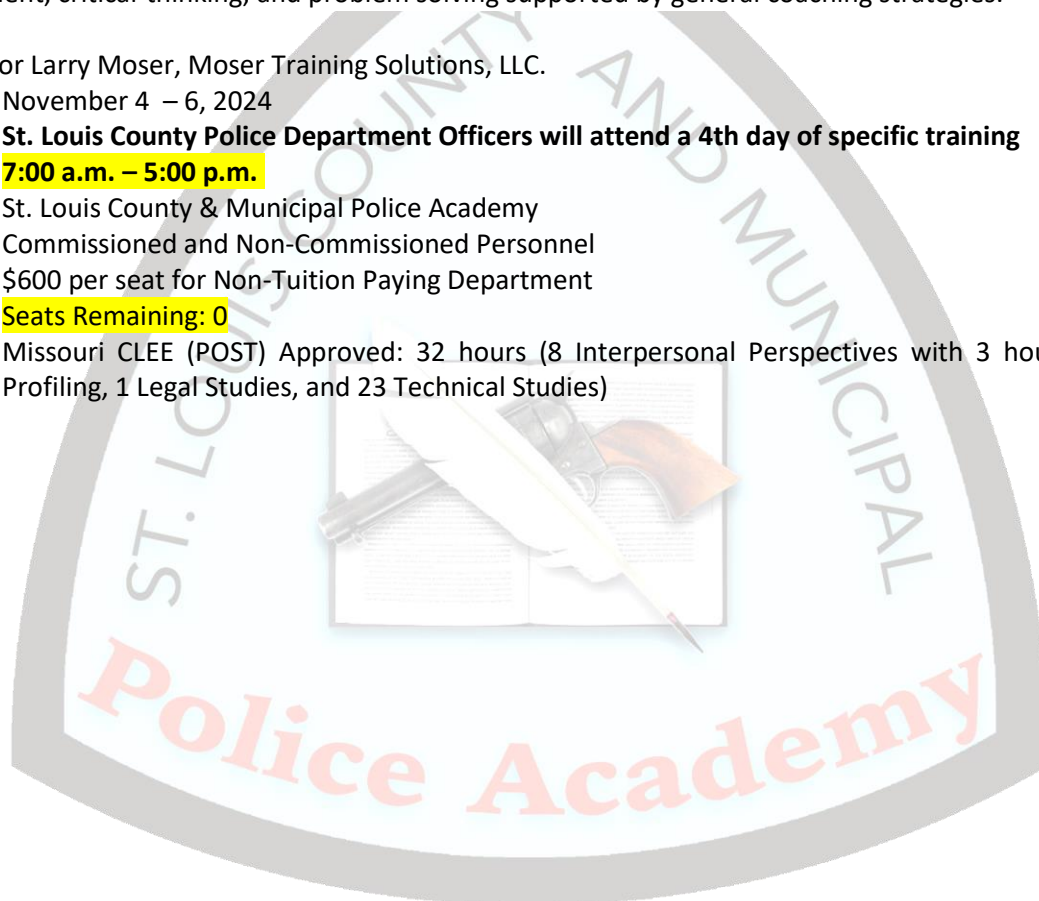

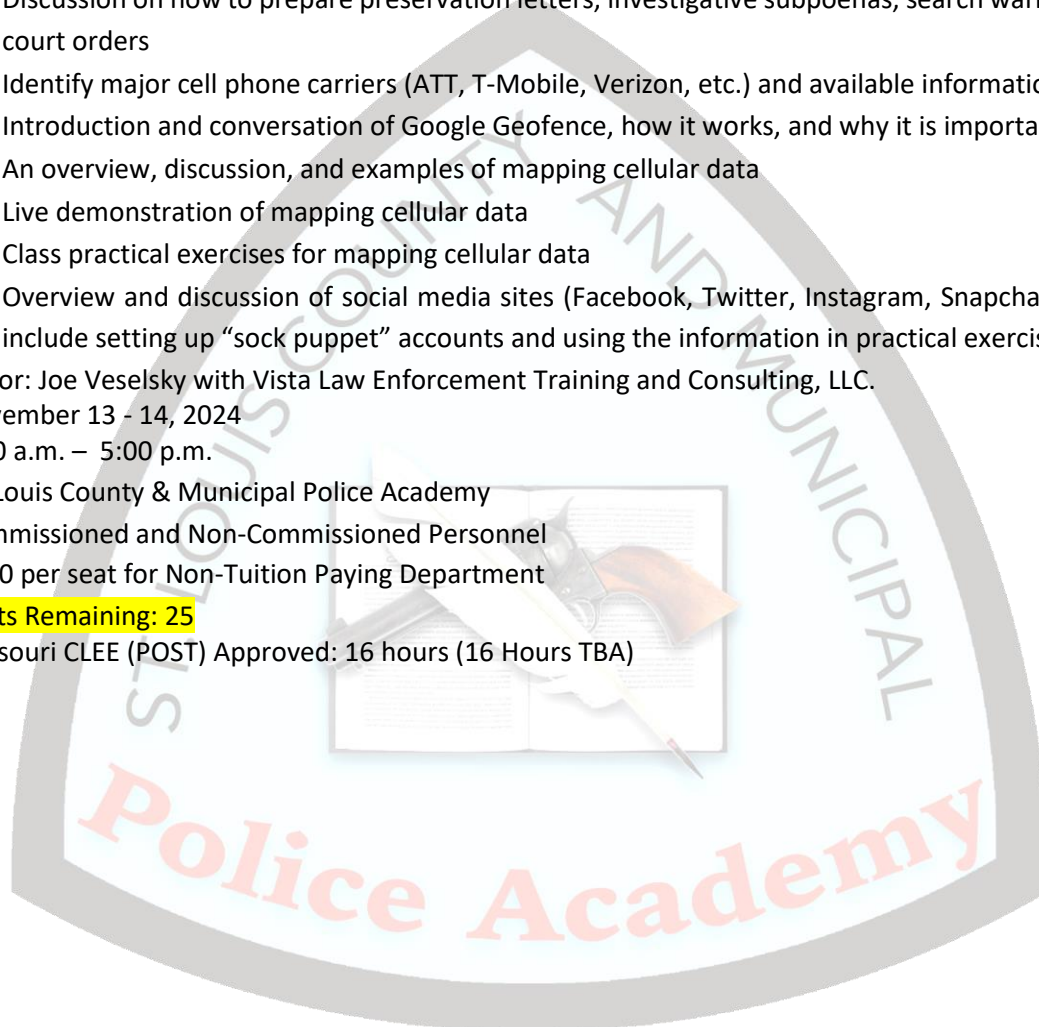

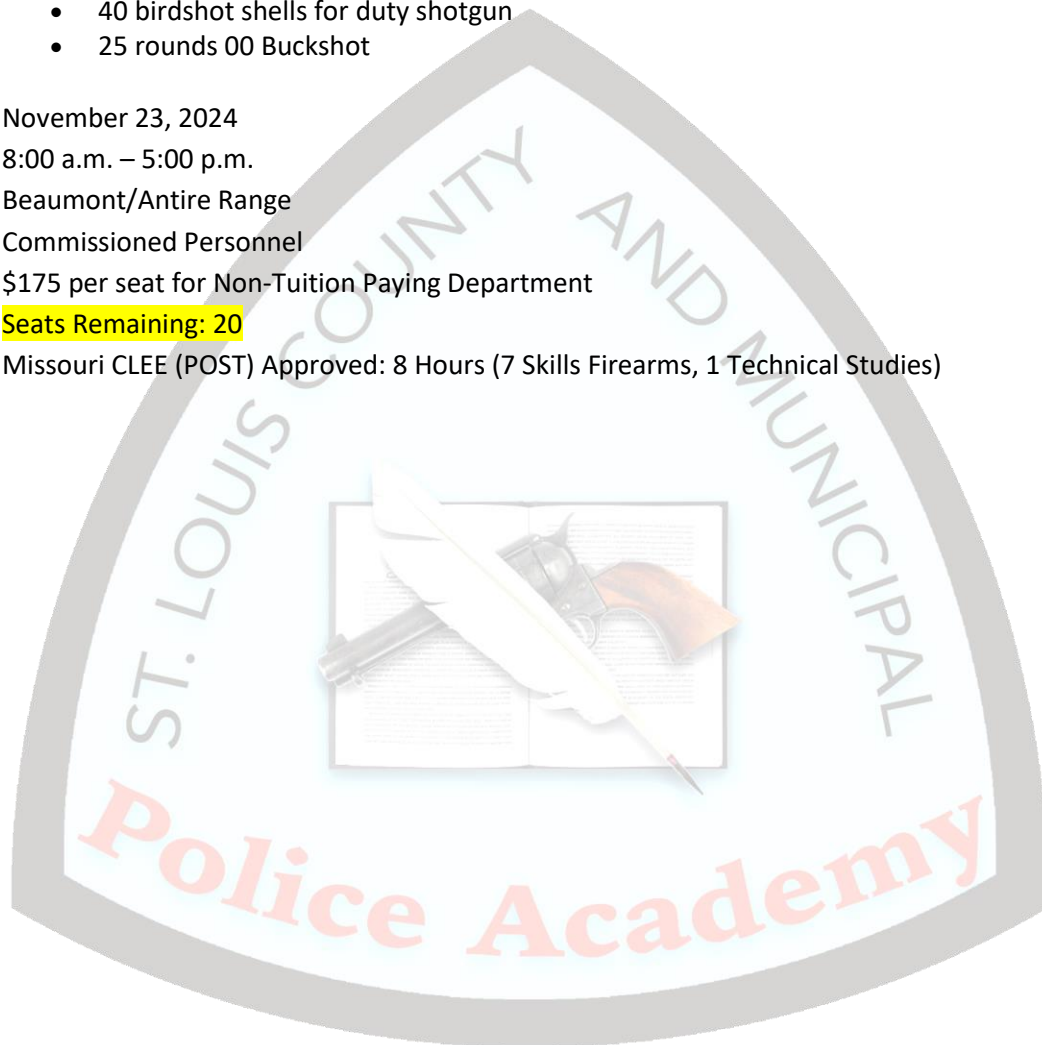
